5.4 GENERAL BUSINESS

Harvesting: Terry O'Neill identified the Douglas Fir adjacent to the areas in his report are a year older but don't have same urgency as the creek is not running through there. It is on the long term plan for harvesting. The Woodburn Douglas Fir will be coming on line and will give a more consistent flow of Douglas Fir. The loggers will start around April/May and have it cleaned up by the end of financial year.

Wilding trees: Pukaki still an issue and there is budget set aside for this. This land is part of the land swap. Spraying the perimeter and chipping the trees may be a more cost effective option.

Simons Hill: There was discussion around how the self-growing Muricata trees could be dealt with. Mr O'Neill will get contractors in to pull/cut larger trees. The trees need to be large enough to remove them all but it becomes more expensive when they are much larger. This is a preferred option to spraying as that can risk overspray onto the crop trees.

The committee agreed Kevin O'Neil will to provide updates and options regarding the Simons Pass Muricata at the next Forestry Committee meeting.

There was discussion around property owner Dan Davies who has approx. 2ha of his land which was planted in trees by the council due to boundary lines not being clear. Mr Davies is happy for the trees to remain on that land. It was agreed Paul Morris would write this letter to Mr Davies to formalise this.

Informed Graham Willetts whose land they will cross to access this area of the plantation. Also discussed with Graham about the cutting and baling of the roadside to reduce the fire hazard at Woodburn.

6	1.5		Spoke with Robin Wilson also from Netcon about entering Woodburn East with a digger to excavate round power poles to check for soundness at the base. Received map of bare land areas remaining at Fox Peak that could be planted. Delivered map to Josh Roxbrough of Prosser Heli who will do a fly over tomorrow to see if spraying for replanting by helicopter is cost effective.
8			Nick Hanns of Plains Orienteering Club contacted me about the making a start in mapping Woodburn Plantation in preparation for a club exercise.
13	2.5		Invoices and office work. Spoke with Graham who has spoken to Dan Davies about the fact that some of our trees are on his land. He is quite relaxed as he understands he may irrigate some land that is not his. Do we need to write up a memorandum to go with an official contract for future reference. Discussed Terrys and my visit with Point Lumber to Burkes Pass, Sandy Cutting, Tekapo Gun Club, Godley Road and Simons Hill on harvest methods and which blocks we should harvest.

6	8.5	64	Meet lan McDonald at Fox Peak to look at areas that could be planted with Attenuata pines. He suggests the most cost effective way would be spot spraying after planting if using pines. Pines would be capable of catching the Douglas fir and being harvested at the same time. Don and I looked at areas with no trees at Fox Peak and in light of the fact that it is leased out for grazing, we recommend that the three bare areas that are surrounded by a permanent fence could be planted and stock be kept out of this area. This would have to be done in consultation with the lease, as access to the leased area would have to be through the area planted in new trees. It may require a holding paddock to be fenced at the bottom of the block using some of the bare ground that could be planted. This area could again be grazed after five or six years. The bulk of the other areas are swampy areas where trees found it too wet to establish when first planted. While there, Don and I did plots 3, 4, 5, 6 and 8 in the top North East corner the rest of the area remains to be thinned. The water tabling done on the track in December by Nigel Blair is working well at present.
11	1		Visited Ian McDonald and get spray options ready for trial spraying at Simons Hill.
12	6	167	Don and I to Simons Hill to do mortality counts. Did mortality counts in three blocks. Block A – 85% survival Block B – 91% survival Block C – 78% survival Muricata wildings 5 to 6 per square metre in a few concentrated areas but overall not too many showing up at present. These wildings are only 2 to 5 inches in height so hopefully the planted trees may be too strong for the wildings.
14			Asked Terry for maps of Simons Hill plantation to fill in separate areas of mortality counts and for Don to plot GPS spot where patches of broome need spraying.
15	0.5		Rang Ross McLeod to discuss fencing at Simons Hill. Rang Kurt Crisp who has now finished plots 1 and 2 at Fox Peak has only a week left to finish 2019 thinning in that plantation. Rang Murray Bell, the leasee at Cabuie to inform him of a start of thinning in the last block left to thin there.
